

Our family association with St Anthony's Primary School started with my father, back in 1960 when they immigrated from Holland in 1953 and then eventually settled in Millicent in 1960.

Being one of 12 children and being a devout Catholic, it was a natural progression and he went to the school with the Sisters Of Mercy. Dad said they were tough, but rightly so he said, he used to get into a lot of trouble as a migrant and not speaking the language as fluently as others.

My journey at St Anthony's started in 1980 after starting preschool at Tantanoola Primary School, my parents decided that both my brothers, Jamie, Collis and myself would start our education at St Anthony's. This involved being bused from Tantanoola to Millicent every day. I am so pleased to see the next generation of Damhuis continue this tradition of being educated at St Anthony's, which is quintessentially such a beautiful nurturing school where I believe the school gets the best out of each and every individual child.

Rhys Damhuis, is a very unique and individual person. He has a lovely disposition and empathy for others. He is not scared of being in front of large crowds and sharing his many talents. The wonderful thing about St Anthony's is that it has nurtured all of the students to embrace their own individual leadership qualities. The teachers I have had throughout my schooling at St Anthony's were Year 1, Mrs McLennan, Year 3 Mrs McLaughlan Year 5 Mr Addicoat, Mrs Irene Hann as principal.

So many wonderful memories such as the year level camp on our farm in 1981 where all of the yr 2/3 class rode on the back of Dads Ute. Can't do that these days! But the best thing about my schooling was when my parents bought the convent and we moved next to the school in 1983, that meant no more bus rides, extra sleep- ins and ice cream for lunch!

I remember one after-school football practice which was held behind the centennial park the boys and I were singing a song from that day's 'Singing and Listening', it was called what's up Fred, I don't believe Fred Smith liked the extra attention and because I lived next to the school, he drove me back home and spoke to Mum!
